### The Vermont Campership Fund Camperships for Vermont Camps

The Vermont Campership Fund was formerly known as the General Breed Fund. The fund was established in 1970 in honor of Stephen "The General" A. Breed. "The General" was a professor at M.I.T., a director at Vermont's Camp Keewaydin, and an advocate for summer camps. His passion was helping youth—no matter their financial background—attend summer camp. In 2018 we adopted a new name, the Vermont Campership Fund, to better communicate Mr. Breed's vision.

The Vermont Campership Fund provides "camperships" – our term for summer camp scholarships granted to qualifying children. Funding is sometimes provided for specific projects which benefit these children and enhance the overall camp experience. Our member camps currently include Camp Sangamon, Camp Betsey Cox, Lotus Lake Day Camp, and Point CounterPoint.

Donations to the fund are 100% tax deductible as the VT Campership fund is a 501-C3, non-profit organization.

In 2019, 73 campers received a tuition discount with help from the Vermont Campership Fund. We know that many letters arrive in your mail boxes this time of year from various organizations all inviting you to offer a gift of a donation. We hope that you will consider the Vermont Campership Fund in the mix as well. Since you all come to camp you know how special it is. You also know that it can take the support of many to keep our program as diverse and inclusive as our mission asks of us. We hope you are able to contribute in any amount this year!
