Lines from Lorrie...

On a delightfully snowy March afternoon, just days ago, a number of Betsey Cox and Sangamon friends gathered at the Farmhouse backyard. Their purpose? To celebrate the recent big snow, to celebrate the coming warmer and lighter days, and to drizzle boiling-hot maple syrup on the clean, sparkling snow! Sugar on snow!



It's a Vermont tradition, one carried on by Lorrie, Kim and Marcy, each of whom, as

young kids, helped with sugaring when their grandparents (founders of Camp Sangamon) managed a large sugaring operation at camp each spring.

Some of you veteran camp people will know that there's a traditional run at Camp Sangamon called the Maple Sugar Run. Like our camp Popsicle Race, it challenges people to walk or run over a path that originally went through Sangamon's many maple trees.

There once was a sugar house along the path where buckets of sap hung to be gathered and boiled over a wood



fire. Sangamon maple trees gave plenty of sap to produce gallons of Sanga Syrup, enough to last through all the breakfast pancakes the next camp summer with more to sell around town. Our grandfather managed the process—and it was a lot of work! We kids helped by

bringing buckets to the gathering tank as best we could. Snow was deep back then! An old tractor, like our John Deere, pulled the big tank to the sugar house where it was emptied into the boiler over a wood fire kept blazing hot by our grandfather.



Here's the magic! Our grandfather kept a pot of syrup on a special burner. It would continue to simmer away until the end of the work day when it was ready for us to have a cup to drizzle on the snow. The very hot syrup, having hit the very cold snow, became lucious instant maple taffy! This year's was really sweet and good even though it was heated up in a modern kitchen. Sugar on Snow is worth doing every year! Ask Priya, Iyla, Amara, Zora, Lonan, Cam, Larkin, Arlo and



their assorted parents! And do you know? The most special part of our sugar-on-snow party this year was that the syrup we used was made by Steve Spensley! Of course it was! Steve has a small sugaring operation right in his back yard and the syrup is.....tasty!

We all had an AWESOME afternoon. To that point, this

winter I have had the time to think a lot about AWE. AWE is the process of being inspired by something remarkable. Could be something a person did. Could be something that happened at camp---Taylor Swift Tuesdays? Leave a Zucchini on Your Neighbor's Porch? Could be something unbelievable from Sunday cookout supper and cabin night when the warmth of your cabin friendships makes you feel so good.

Scientific name: Meleagris gallopavo

Lorrie mentioned 11 wild turkeys that visit the Farmhouse each morning—here they are! A tom turkey and several hens enjoying the birdseed Mike and Lorrie provided this winter.

Wild turkeys are large plump birds with long legs and round tails. Turkeys forage mostly on the ground for nuts (particular to acorns), insects, and berries. They get around by walking most of the time. They can fly if needed, but usually only when threatened. They roost in low trees at night. Turkeys have one brood each year with between 4-17 eggs. (We had a clutch of eggs between Deer's Leap and the tennis court a few years back, that hatched during precamp. It was very fun to see!) Wild Turkey chicks stay in the nest for a very short time and then the chicks follow their mother in a

"family flock" for most of the year. Kind of like our cabin groups that stick together. The have a bronze colored iridescence to their feathers, and white bars on their wing feathers and the tips of their tails. The




males perform courtship displays of their feathers and vocalize with the classic "gobble".
